The NZ Transport Agency (Transport Agency) is marking this further submission in accordance with Clause 8 of Schedule 1 of the Resource Management Act 1991.

The Transport Agency has an interest in Proposed Plan Change 58 (PPC58) that is greater than the interest the general public for reasons including the following:

- The Transport Agency has an interest as a provider of infrastructure that is potentially affected by the relevant submissions
- The Transport Agency made an original submission on matters raised or affected by those submissions.

The Transport Agency's position in relation to specific submissions is identified within the table included in Schedule 1 (attached). Generally, the Transport Agency is seeking to ensure that all transport impacts are assessed when considering the zoning implications of PPC 58. If the suggested zone changes are shown not to impact on the operation of the transport network, the Transport Agency will review its further submission, and withdraw and submissions accordingly. We welcome the opportunity to work with the primary submitters and the Council to resolve our concerns.



The Transport Agency seeks the relief laid out in Schedule 1, including any consequential relief required to give effect to our requests. If we achieve resolution with other parties we seek the relief necessary to support that resolution.

The Transport Agency notes that in the Summary of Submissions by the Council, Council has incorrectly summarised the Transport Agency's primary submission points. The summary states¹ that the Transport Agency sought the remedy "undertake safety and audit of Martins Ave and Bird Lane intersections with State Highway 6". This is not an accurate reflection of our primary submission, which sought that "an assessment is undertaken to establish whether these intersections are able to continue to function at a safe and appropriate level of service". The assessment tool would more appropriately be a Traffic Impact Assessment, and not a "safety and audit".

The Transport Agency wishes to be heard in support of its further submission. Due to the specific interests of the Transport Agency it will not consider presenting a joint case with others at a hearing.

#### Response to **Submission 3965.1**

The Pitfure catchment floods in high rainfall events, therefore I would oppose Submission 3965.1 which supports residential zoning in area DA 13 which is prone to flooding. This can be seen by observing the deep swales behind St Joseph's Church, Wakefield. In high flow, the Pitfure re-occupies these old stream-beds.



The existing contiguous residential development in Ryland Ave, Wakefield depends on runoff being channelled towards the Pitfure. Their problem is that, in floods, water from the stream comes the other way, threatening inundation of the dwellings.

If it is important that Wakefield expands, then the TDC needs to be proactive to reduce flooding from the Pitfure and to ensure adequate provision to deal with future extreme weather events. Detention areas should be set aside in the rough grazing farmland of the upper contributory stream valleys (Church Valley, Gibbs Valley and the area zoned Rural Residential South of Wakefield) with ponding areas set aside, similar to those on Ben Cooper Park and Washbourne Gardens. This would not only help prevent flooding but, in prolonging the time the water takes to dissipate, will allow water the time to soak into the ground.

While these valleys are agricultural land, there is the possibility of action by the council to prevent future flooding and landowners might be amenable to minor works. Once housing development in these valleys has taken place, there is no hope of improvement.

The Pitfure Stream holds 3 - 5 cumecs as an absolute maximum. The catchment is about 23 sq km and if 60ml falls that is 1.4 million cubic metres of water. If it falls in 3 hours, then about 130 cumecs need to drain away. It has to soak in, be absorbed by groundwater and flow across the valley floor. It is not possible to keep this much rain-water in the creek; a 5 cumec stream will not contain it.

As housing replaces rural land, and trees are removed, increased run-off causes flooding while reducing detention and groundwater replenishment. Flooding in the lower part of the Pitfure valley at Spring Grove has increased noticeably over the last few years.

#### Response to **Submission 3965.3**

A relatively minor rainfall event in June 2014 completely swamped the small detention pond on Edwards Rd which is supposed to detain water draining the large Rural Residential area south of Wakefield. This picture shows logs and debris where a lake formed south of Edwards Rd, before flooding the road. Road clearance had been done before this photo was taken a day later.





The area by Edward's Rd and the cycleway receives water from Church Valley, Gibbs Valley and the Gossey Housing Development and is therefore unlikely to be suitable for housing without effective detention measures in these three areas.


Improving water detention in the Pitfure catchment will have the added advantage that it will add to the Wai-iti and the lower Waimea groundwater.

This challenge is a community problem which will be exacerbated by climate change and it is essential the council is proactive.

### Response to **Submission 3965.2**

While the area zoned residential on Higgins Rd (DA17) is above the flood-plain area of the Pitfure, it would be unwise to place residential property directly below the two dams in the side-valley.

#### Submission on Catchment Planning in the Wakefield Area

#### The Pitfure Problem

The Pitfure catchment is prone to flooding in high rainfall events and in summer the groundwater is depleted compared to the past. It is indicative of the degree to which groundwater has been lowered that old-timers recall the Pitfure as flowing all the year round and being a great white-baiting stream. It is now dry for months in the summer.

The proposal being developed for housing near Wakefield in the flat valley occupied by the Pitfure stream must take into account the needs of those downstream and make adequate provision for detention of run-off rainwater in high intensity events. The plan must take account of the potential for floodwater to inundate the valley floor, flood proximal housing estates and send flood pulses down the valley, causing problems at Spring Grove.


#### Telenius Rd at Spring Grove June 2014



Flooding in the lower part of the Wai-iti/Pitfure valley has increased over the last few years. Trees have been removed, farmers are clearing rough grazing, and housing is replacing rural land. All this is increasing run-off and causing flooding while reducing detention and groundwater replenishment

A relatively minor rainfall event last June caused a lake in much of the lower valley, threatening houses in Spring Grove and flooding others. See Appendix 2 for details

Basically, the Pitfure Stream holds 3 - 5 cumecs absolute maximum. The catchment is about 23 sq km. It is not possible to keep this much rain-water in the creek (if 60ml falls that is 1.4 million cubic metres of water). If it falls in 3 hours, then about 130 cumecs need to drain away. It has to soak in, be absorbed by groundwater and flow across the valley floor. A 5 cumec stream will not contain it.





The council needs to be proactive in their planning to deal with future weather events and improve the water supply at the same time by improving water detention in the Pitfure catchment. This will add to the Wai-iti and the lower Waimea groundwater.


Detention areas are needed in the rough grazing farmland of the Church Valley and the valley next to it, where this plan proposes development (pink area). The areas where water will be allowed to pond in extreme events need to be put in place at the very start of the planning process, before sections are subdivided. This will prevent flooding and, in prolonging the time the water takes to dissipate, will allow water time to soak into the ground.

While there is only rough grazing in these basins, there is the possibility of action by the council to prevent future flooding. Once housing development has taken place, there is no hope of improvement. New subdivisions must undertake adequate detention measures, with ponding areas set aside, similar to those on Ben Cooper Park and Washbourne Gardens.

This challenge is a community problem which will be exacerbated by climate change and it is essential the council is proactive.

#### **Appendix 1 June 2014 Event**

In June last year, a rainfall event caused unprecedented flooding in Spring Grove. Water levels exceeded those here in either of the previous two tropical depressions that hit the region. This level I have not seen happen in the eighteen years I have lived here.



At 8.50 am 26th June. The whole event is over and can be seen in this Council graph.

From the data on Council Records this was a run-off event. The ground water was not full. The rain was intense, but not even in the top ten rainfalls of the last ten years. The following pictures show the extent of the problem.

Looking from Barton's Lane and across Higgins Rd. The whole valley is a lake.





The Pitfure Creek in major flow.

The major flooding at Spring Grove happened after it stopped raining, overwhelming the culvert in Telenius Rd and flooding houses. Photo below. This was because all the water arrived down-valley at the same time.

By 3.50pm the rain stopped, and the picture on the left shows the water levels at the Telenius culvert. This is the same place at 4.20pm. The culvert, right side of picture, has been totally overwhelmed.
