SUBMISSION IN OPPOSITION TO THE RELOCATION OF THE KAITERITERI SKI ACCESS LANE

My view is that any change to the existing Ski Access Lane must improve safety – not only for the users (skiers and boats) but also for those using the areas adjoining and accessing through the Ski Access Lane.

Neither of the reports from the Harbour Master or the Warden refer to any incidents where life or limb were in danger. In fact the Warden's report made reference to improved understanding of the measures and compromises introduced over the last two years and no incidents involving danger or safety.

I suggest the proposed new site for the Ski Access Lane is unsuitable and dangerous. It gives no consideration to the exposed nature of the beach and the wave action at Little Kaiteriteri during a typical summer afternoon sea breeze. In those conditions, the beach is positively dangerous for boating especially loading and unloading boats. It would be inviting injury. Conversely, the current position of the ski access lane on the beach at main Kaiteriteri in those weather conditions is decidedly tranquil.

It is inevitable that someone will be trapped under, or knocked over by a boat caught by a surging wave in the new location. Whilst responsibility or fault will lie directly with the boat operator, it was TDC that forced the skiers into an unsuitable area from an area from which no accidents have been reported and that has worked well for all concerned.

My view is that the existing location, with the controls around it, works best for all who use it and the beaches around it.

I wish to be present my submission in person to a Council hearing.

Submission on Bylaw 3.7.2, Schedule 2A, Paragraph 3, Figure 19 Kaiteriteri, Map 15 – Access Lane for Water Skiing

I am completely opposed to the proposed creation of an access lane for water skiing off the beach at Little Kaiteriteri because:

- 1. There are two parts to Kaiteriteri Bay:
 - The main beach, which is the commercial area, most popular with tourists and other visitors. It is the main swimming area, the site of the boat launching ramp and presently access for water skiing and other aquatic sports.

All these activities co-exist there perfectly well, and this includes the young children who splash happily in the shallow water (boat access prohibited) beneath the Reserve at the end of the estuary. I have heard of no accidents involving water skiers and other beach users in this present access area.

NO CHANGE IS NECESSARY, NOR IS ANY CHANGE DESIRED BY THOSE WHO NOW USE THE MAIN BEACH FOR COMMERCIAL OR ANY OTHER PURPOSES.

 Little Kalteriteri beach, the non-commercial family beach. The safest and most favoured place in the Bay for family swimming, sunbathing and picnics. The most peaceful and private part of Kaiteriteri. It is also a residential area.

Your harbourmaster could not have selected a more inappropriate site for a new access lane for water skiing than immediately below the bachs and houses closest to the beach in the whole of the Bay.

PLEASE DO NOT RUIN LITTLE KAITERITERI.

- Water skiing in and out of the proposed Access Lane would cause very considerable noise and disturbance to all users of the Little Kaiteriteri beach and especially to those in the bachs above.
 - Swimmers (many of them children), sunbathers and picnickers would be displaced to more exposed parts of the beach. In summer this would happen all day, from sunrise to sunset.
- I am not absolutely certain where the most westerly marker buoy would be laid, but I fear that tow boats entering the Access Lane, keeping to starboard, could be

in danger of striking the rocks immediately below the first baches. These rocks are exposed only at low tide and would not be known to all boat operators.

4. Wind and wave action into Little Kaiteriteri is significantly greater than at the Main Beach, which is much more sheltered. The proposed Access Lane would often be a very difficult place to present a bow or stern to the beach to drop off or pick up skiers.

I know this to be the case - my wife has fallen into the water there several times when going ashore to pick up a car and boat trailer from our bach.

YOUR PROPOSED ACCESS LANE IS NOT SAFE FOR PURPOSE.

- The restrictions you propose to place upon users of the Access Lane (keep to the right, travel straight in and straight out) are impractical and would be unknown to most users. They would not be observed and chaos would ensue.
- The present ski access area towards (but not in) the lagoon end of the main beach is more sheltered, much safer, and is adjacent to a commercial, nonresidential area where noise and disturbance do not matter nearly so much.
- 7. The catamarans that take tourists along the Abel Tasman coast have to pick up and drop off passengers at the Little Kaiteriteri beach whenever the tide is too low to do so at the main beach, which is often. They do this exactly where you propose to put an Access Lane. They and their passengers will not be pleased to have to walk quite a long way further and into more exposed waters.
- 8. I presume and hope that there would be no new launching ramp in the proposed Access Lane, but inevitably cars and trailers would be parked behind the Lane and/or on the Alex Ryder Reserve. The native plants, established by volunteers to protect the beach, would be endangered and damaged.

I would like to submit on the above issue as an owner of property adjoining Tata Beach which is open for public consultation.

Issues that I am concerned about are;

- 1. The boat mooring area (between the ski lane and the power craft prohibited area). This area is un-practicable in its location and size.
 - a. Location: When ski towing boats drop their skiers and are retrieving their ski ropes it is often prudent to vacant the lane to make space for incoming boats. It is often safer to moving into the zone currently anticipated as mooring area (at 5 knots) while retrieving the rope (or device towed) before returning to the beach. Having a band of boats moored in this area intensively is cramping the whole area far too much and unnecessarily.
 - b. Size: Estimated width of 25 m if that is correct is far too narrow. It takes no account of the number of boats likely to be anchored, and provides no swinging area for wind or tide. It is impracticable for boats to be anchored in a line out from the beach along the side of the mooring lane. If it is impracticable then it won't get used and will provide significant enforcement difficulties. At least double the area is required, or remove and permit anchoring in the 'powercraft prohibited' area as currently occurs. We see no reason justified for the change.
- 2. Visible signage at both the boat launching ramp and at the ski lane;
 - a. Signage is required to clearly notify both swimmers and paddle craft that they should not be in the ski lane at any time that skiers or motorised activity are operating. We often observe the conflict and it is very dangerous. More signage is definitely required.
- 3. Power craft prohibited;
 - a. This is not accepted as reasonable. Often small motorised craft operating is reasonable, but suggest that the 5 knot zone needs more strict enforcement.
 - b. Access for anchoring is acceptable to us and preferred.
 - Anchoring should be permitted as currently occurs.

We see no justification for the proposed changes proposed. The whole safety of the beach would be significantly improved with better control over the ski lane with better and clearer signage. In our view (and as a generalisation) most of the issues arise from ignorance of the basic rules by all users.

We look forward to your consideration of our views on the matter.

To whom it may concern.

I write to object in the strongest possible terms to the suggestion contained in the 'Draft Tasman District Council Consolidated Bylaw, Chapter 5: Navigation Bylaws 2014' that there should be a water ski lane at Little Kaiteriteri.

I have owned 8a Goodall Place, which is adjacent to both the Little Kaiteriteri beach and Ryder Reserve since November 1992, while my sisters and I own a house in Rowling Road, which my Father had built for the family in the early 1950s. So I am sure you will readily agree I am well placed and qualified to comment on the proposal for a new water ski lane. I am fully familiar with the numbers of people who regularly use Little Kaiteriteri beach for walking, jogging, swimming and generally relaxing on its golden sands. Families with young children and many of the district's retired population frequent this beach. They do so knowing that it is safe and any boats must stay beyond the markers that are sensibly sited a reasonable distance offshore.

No.

Meanwhile, Kaiteriteri itself is very much the acknowledged commercial hub of the community, with a shop, licensed restaurants, large campsite and tourist accommodation, as well as the place from where the ferries and water taxis as well as private boats operate. Indeed, the system they have there to handle both commercial and recreational boat traffic seems to cope well thanks to everyone being very much aware of their responsibilities as boat owners for the safety of the general public and others on the water.

To suggest that there is now a need for another water ski lane that would inevitably and unsafely impinge on the many users of Little Kaiteriteri beach is frankly illogical madness. Happily that view is clearly shared by the large number of concerned local residents and visitors who attended a meeting at the Ryder Reserve on the afternoon of Saturday, 18 January. There was unanimous outrage at the proposed ski lane, with feelings running so high that a committee was immediately formed of key local opinion-formers, who were authorised to fight this nonsense and present a united front against the proposal on behalf of the very concerned local community.

As a keen naturalist and gardener, I am also deeply worried about increased vehicle traffic and accompanying passengers being absorbed into such a small area. There would be unacceptable erosion around the beach and its environs, with the penguins that have nested for many years under my house and near the shoreline also going to be adversely impacted. And for what? An unnecessary and unwanted ski lane, whose purpose is already well handled by the launching facilities that already exist in Kaiteriteri itself.

While I know that the group will have full formal and legal representation at the verbal submissions likely to be held in Richmond in May or June, for which I know a very detailed submission will be submitted by 28 March, I would also like to be advised when such hearings are taking place so I can attend in my own right.

From all the above, and doubtless from many others, you will realise there is deep concern and public outrage at the idea of a ski lane being proposed for Little Kaiteriteri., so I welcome this opportunity for public consultation and the chance to express my strong views.

May commonsense and the clear expression of public concern about a totally inappropriate development win the day. Indeed, the beautiful beach at Little Kaiteriteri and its concerned users need and deserve nothing less!

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- 1.Little Kaiteri is very popular with people who <u>get away</u> from all motor boats including those towing water skiers. The number of users of Little Kaiteri and the variety of activities is on the increase. It is popular with swimmers, kayakers, canoeists, paddle boarders, sailors of small yachts, and people strolling or relaxing on the beach.
- 2.Has water skiing become an undesirable activity where it is on main Kaiteriteri Beach? Is it because it is a safety risk for other beach users, or it is noisy, or it takes up too much space for a limited number of users? If any of these reasons apply, water skiing is not suitable for Little Kaiteri either where people are actively getting away from motor boats.
- 3. While a ski lane confines motor boats and water skiers within a zone, it does not limit affects to that zone. The wake of speed boats definitely affects swimmers and paddlers of kayaks and boards and sailing of small yachts. The noise carries well beyond the zone. Also these users of the beach actively keep away from speed boats for obvious safety reasons. Keeping away from water skiing means other beach users actually end up with much less space than is indicated by lane markers.
- 4. Should we in fact be looking at applying a single speed restriction to all water craft in the Kaiteriteri/Little Kaiteriteri bay area.
- 5. The activities at Little Kaiteri may be regarded as more sedate than at Kaiteriteri Beach, but does not mean the beach is under utilised. It is well utilised and becoming more popular as a great alternative to busy Kaiteriteri.
- 6. If the issue is that water ferries want exclusive use of the water ski zone on Kaiteriteri Beach, that should be dealt with in a way that does not push an undesired activity onto another place like Little Kaiteriteri.

7. In the current situation, water skiing tends to divide Kaiteriteri Beach in half because it is unsafe for all other users of the beach to cross the ski lane. While Kaiteriteri Beach and Little Kaiteriteri beach are two separate beaches the do very much share the same small bay. Moving the water ski lane would result in effectively be dividing the two beaches more from each other and confining other water activities to two separate sides of an already small bay.

- 8. The proposed ski lane at Little Kaiteri would be at the foot of the walkway over the hill to Kaiteriteri Beach. Activity related to proposed ski lane would negatively impact on the many users of that walkway. There would also of course be the direct negative impact on those beach users who already enjoy that end of Little Kaiteri Beach. At present there is reasonable parking space for those who use that NW end of Little Kaiteri beach. This would be taken over and congested by vehicles used by water skiers. All in all the number of people being directly and negatively affected by the ski lane would far outnumber the number of people using that area for water skiing.
 - 9. Map 15 shows the proposed ski lane taking up a third to a half of the currently used swimming space of Little Kaitere with a swimming area where very few swimmers swim. The proposed swimming area is rocky and difficult to access. In fact it would be dangerous to have children swim there. This silly idea cannot possibly have come from anyone who uses Little Kaiteri for swimming.

We strongly OPPOSE any establishment of ski zone anywhere on Little Kalteriteri

In January I spent a pleasant few days with my extended family camping at Totaranui.

I was distressed by the behaviour of a small number of irresponsible jet ski operators; jet skis were driven into the estuary; speeds exceeded the allowable limit; the skis were occasionally outside the set areas; and young drivers were often in charge. I complained to the adults nominally in charge of the jet skis and was brushed off.

I appreciate that the DOC manager is empowered as the Acting Harbour Master. However, when I complained to DOC staff I was told that they were too busy to deal with errant jet ski drivers.

Totaranui and the Abel Tasman National Park are not suitable venues for jet skis - they go against the atmosphere and values of the park.

I suggest jet skis be restricted to the Pohara/Tarakohe and Kaiteriteri environs. If this is not considered feasible, I suggest they be restricted to the south eastern end of Totaranui, well away from the estuary where children and families tend to congregate.

Reason: The western side of Golden Bay from Farewell Spit to Parapara is a significant area for migratory birds.

TDC has recently provided an updated survey on the wading and migratory birds in Golden Bay which has highlighted this and so TDC should be sensitive to the destructiveness ski lanes etc could have. Bird watchers from all over the world are some of our tourists too and we need to be pro active in the protection of these vulnerable birds, and seen to be so by those overseas visitors.

Ski lanes at Pakawau and Parapara would only be used at high tide and this is the very time the birds congregate together in small areas and so are disturbed en mass, leaving them no safer area to move too.

PLEASE DO NOT permit ski lanes at Pakawau and Parapara.



Partial Support - changes and/or additions required

Reasons: We strongly believe the time has come to designate Little Kaiteriteri waters (out 200m from shore) as non-motorised in their entirety. People gravitate to Little Kaiteriteri for safer, quieter and less congested swimming/paddling/skim boarding often from the Main Kaiteriteri beach. We feel the area from the Kaiteriteri Lagoon outlet all the way south to the southern end of Little Kaiteriteri beach should be Anchoring Prohibited, Power Craft Prohibited, Water Skiing Prohibited, and designated as a reserved Swimming Area with non-motorised crafts allowed as well. Mixed use (motorised/non-motorised) is a recipe for accidents/injuries and it's just a matter of time before there is a serious collision.

Little Kaiteriteri offers poor anchoring but we often see craft that have moored just off shore. Make Little Kaiteriteri Anchoring Prohibited.

Concentrate motorised craft use (commercial and private) in the vicinity of the Main Kaiteriteri beach, restrict commercial craft from accessing the beach south of the Kaiteriteri Lagoon outlet especially at King low tides, and draw a line from the lagoon outlet south to the southern end of Little Kaiteriteri beach, 200m out from shore, for passive, non-motorised use. Map attached. Decision sought: Make all of Little Kaiteriteri waters from Kaiteriteri Lagoon outlet south to the southern end of Little Kaiteriteri, 200m from shore, Power Craft Prohibited.




Figure 19: Kaiteriteri Bay - Map 15







I object to the area outlined in Figure 12 Awaroa Map 8 becoming a Swirmming Area only area. As a property owner adjacent to this area, our legal access is via this area, usually using an powered 13 metre dinghy. Dinghys are moved out along the point away from the main swimming area, especially during the summer months. Traditionally a sign is put in this area during these months stating it is for swimming only. This has worked well for the past 10-15 years. The reason for this was to stop the trailer sailers and larger powered vessel from anchoring in this area. Imposing this reserved areas means that many property owners will not be able to use their crafts to access their properties, when in fact this areas is only using extensively during Dec-Feb each year for swimming.

Oppose. Although we do not own land in the Tasman DC we have holidayed at Kaiteriteri every summer for the last 18 years, for at least a week each year.

Submission

We object to the water skiing lane moving to Little Kaiteriteri for the following reasons:

Little Kaiteri is used currently as a swimming and family friendly beach with ample room behind for parking and picnicking away from the beach. This ability will be removed.

Water skiing from Little Kaiteri is dangerous and not as good as main Kaiteri. This is because the prevailing wind comes into Little Kaiteri making it rougher and because of the numerous underwater rocks at the northern end of the proposed water ski lane. Although the best places for water skiing in Kaiteri Bay is near the boat ramp, we accept this is not a feasible location. However moving further away from the boat ramp is deteriorating the quality of the skiing area and making it dangerous because of the rocks.

The proposed swimming area in Little Kalteri is dangerous, because of the rocks throughout this area, and very limited beach frontage. It will become impossible for families with small children to swim at or enjoy Little Kalteri if the proposed water ski lane proceeds and most unenjoyable and dangerous for others because of the rocks and islands in the proposed swim area.

The reserves in Little Kaiteri will become one large boat trailer park as people use this area to park their trailers and pick up their passengers before heading to the many beaches in the Abel Tasman National Park.

We enjoy not just splashing around in the beach but also swimming distances for our exercise. With the removal of the current swimming area at Little Kaiteri this will become impossible.

The main Kalteri beach is the best place for power boats to come and go from, adjacent to the shop and cafes and aligned with the commercial boat access area.

Decision Sought

We ask that the Tasman DC leave the water ski lane at its current site on main Kaiteri beach. However if the Tasman DC considers this not appropriate consideration should be given to not allowing water skiing at all in Kaiteriteri Bay. The Bay is very busy in summer with families, swimmers, commercial boats and pleasure boats coming and going that water skiing creates an unnecessary and extra hazard.

Dear Sirs.

I set out below my submissions in respect of the Draft Tasman District Council Consolidated Bylaw, Chapter 5, Navigation Bylaws 2014.

i strongly oppose the propose introduction of new Navigation Bylaws (specifically Bylaw 3.7.2) that would see a ski access lane placed at Little Kaiteriteri Beach. In addition, I strongly oppose the ensuing proposal to move the swimming area to Torlesse Rocks. Background

- I currently live in Hong Kong. However, I consider Little Kaiteriteri to be "home" as it is where my parents, Ronald and Sally Cameron, now permanently reside (at 8 Goodall Place, directly everlooking the proposed new ski lane).
- I have extremely strong emotional times to the Tasman region and particularly Kaiteriteri, such ties which have only grown stronger as I have become a sometimeshomesick Kiwi expat.
- However, emotional and personal submissions aside for the moment, my primary opposition to the moving of the ski access and swimming areas is due to the alarming and immediate threat that such changes would pose to public safety.

Public Safety

I consider that there are three key areas where public safety will be put at risk by the proposed changes, as follows:

Safety to water-skiers and boaties

- Quite simply, Little Kaiteri is not a safe place for water-skiers to take off. Little Kaiteri receives a strong shore break due to the prevailing winds. Beginner skiers will struggle to set themselves up properly to take off when being battered by waves. They will also be unable to have anyone stand behind them to steady them as they take off, as the drop-off is too steep. Advanced skiers will be trustrated at the inability to do a beach start due to the waves and steep drop off. The calmer and lesser wave action of main Kaiteriteri is why the water ski lane was placed there in the first place.
- The strong shore break also sees boats swept into a side on swell when discharging or picking up passengers. This presents a danger to passengers and skiers as the engine prop (of outboard motors) will suddenly swing close to the skier who is setting up in the water, or the embarking/disembarking

2. Safety to swimmers

Moving the swimming area closer to Torlesse Rocks will inevitably see people swimming too close to the rocks, or being tempted to jump off the rocks, all of which greatly increase the chances of injury and drowning. There are a number

118 037

of submerged rocks in this area which pose a hazard to swimmers and boaties. Similarities can be drawn to Sumner Beach in Christchurch which is flanked by rocks at both ends, and where lifeguards are always careful to keep the flagged swimming areas well away from the rocks.

This passage way closest to the rocks also presents the safest area for boats to enter at a slow speed to pick up and drop off passengers. Blocking this off by placing a swimming area there will force boaties to drop off/pick up on the roughest part of the beach.

3. Safety to pedestrians and picnickers on the Reserve

- This may well be the key danger that will be exacerbated by the proposed changes.
- Already, cars drive far too quickly along the road into the Alex Ryder Reserve and along the beachfront. Beachgoers blithely walk from the coastal path onto this road (often not realising that it is in fact a road), including toddlers and children who will often run ahead of parents. The number of near-misses I have seen is frightening. I have, oftentimes run out onto the reserve to tell children to move away from where they are playing on the road. Already in the current circumstances I consider that the chances of serious injury or fatality are extremely high if changes are not made. With the increased traffic that moving the ski lane would bring, injury or fatality is almost inevitable.
- Moving the ski lane will also have the effect of removing any safe picnicking
 area on the reserve. Aiready on busy days much of the reserve is taken up by
 cars, boat trailers and campervans. This not only destroys a lovely picnicking
 spot, it also leads to increased litter, including people peeing in the bushes (and
 leaving toilet paper!) as the public toilets are hidden and not properly sign
 posted.

2. PRESERVATION OF THE CHARACTER OF KAITERITERI

- Secondly to issues of public safety, I strongly oppose the proposed changes in that they will irreversibly damage the special character of Kaiteriteri.
- Tourists from China and the wider Asia region are absolutely paramount to New Zealand's tourism industry. I deal regularly with Chinese clients and acquaintances here in Hong Kong, and of course spend a lot of time espousing New Zealand's beauty. When asked for recommendations from those planning trips to New Zealand, I of course always tell my clients to ensure that they include Kaiteriteri on their itinerary.
- It is a sad hallmark of the world's most popular beaches, particularly those throughout Asia, that they are marred by noisy jet skis, boats and other water sports. With this comes the inevitable smell of motor fuel, stirred up murky water, and the alarmingly familiar "near-misses" as boat operators become all too careless with their speed and proximity to swimmers.
- The beauty of Kaiteriteri (aside from its obvious natural beauty) is that it offers the best of both worlds - exciting water sports from the main beach, for the benefit of participants and spectators alike, combined with a safe and peaceful swimming and relaxation area in Little Kaiteriteri. This is a unique

characteristic of Kaiteriteri, which we will lose if the proposed changes go ahead.

 I am a keen water-skier myself and do not wish to see water sports banned from Kaiteri by any means. However, the safe and pristine environment of Little Kaiteri beach, combined with the activities offered on Kaiteri beach just a short walk away, is a key reason why Kaiteri is such an attractive location for international and local visitors. It would be a travesty to destroy this.

I strongly oppose the proposed introduction of new Navigation Bylaws that would see a ski access lane placed at Little Kaiteriteri beach and furthermore the resultant proposal to herd swimmers down to the eastern end of the beach by Torlesse Rocks.

The proposals being made are abhorrent for a good many reasons and defy logic for an unanimous numbers of residents and other concerned parties as clearly expressed at the public meeting held in the Alex Ryder Reserve on the 18th of January and attended by over 100 persons.

As a permanent resident at 8 Goodall Place, Little Kaiteriteri, and with our property bordering and overlooking the Reserve and the beach itself, we are very well placed to observe the daily activity, demographics and behaviour in the area.

Our objections:

- 1. PUBLIC SAFETY IS AN ISSUE..
- i. The introduction of a water ski access lane would take away the safe, passive and family orientated nature of Little Kaiteriteri beach without a doubt. Users know this to be a motor boat free beach and are encouraged to enjoy passive watersports and swimming long the full extent of the beach, without fear of being taken out by a powerboat, aterskier or shuttle boat.
- 11. The present buoy layout including the yellow 5 knot buoy (installed following my recommendation) works well and gives recognised security to users in the water. It is rare to see powercraft enter the area at speed and overall the 5 knots is respected. Offenders at speed are nearly always those in tinnie hire boats taken for the day and raises another issue of whether these users are given a proper briefing as to the rules.
- iii. Distasteful behaviour by boaties and unsafe practices can more easily by observed and policed at main Kaiteriteri beach. The present ski access lane at main Kaiteriteri works very well and boaties have become familiar with the guidelines. The proposed new bylaw is simply a 'solution trying to find a problem" and unwarranted.

iv. Water conditions:

It is well known by boaties and certainly regular users of the beach areas in Kaiteriteri that wave action is heightened at Little Kaiteriteri by being more exposed to the prevailing sea breezes, northerlies and the open sea. The calmer and lesser wave action of main Kaiteriteri is one of the reasons why skiing was placed there in the first place.

The erskiers themselves will support this view. These proposals are helping no one.

vi. Roll action.

Little Kaiteriteri gets a sea roll action going in the prevailing sea breezes and many skippers (even the experienced) can get caught out when discharging and taking crew onboard in these conditions. Little Kaiteriteri drops away more quickly than the main beach which creates more of a shorebreak than you get in the existing ski access lane. I am a boatie and have personal experience of these conditions.

Once underway a skier or wakeboarder will find the conditions more challenging and especially learners.

vii. Double trouble -

The safest part of Little Kaiteriteri beach for bringing a vessel to shore is that of the eastern end inshore of and sheltered by Torlese rocks. By introducing a ski access lane, and as a result further sectioning off a swimming zone to the same eastern area, you are taking away the only safe vessel landing and so increasing the risks associated with waterskiing and beaching at Little Kaiteriteri.

vii. Traffic and pedestrian safety concerns.
The Alex Ryder Reserve is enterd by a public dirt road than runs parallel to Little Kaiteriteri beach though to the western end of the beach.

Introduction of a ski access lane at Little Kaiteriteri will guarantee a marked increase in road traffic down Rowling Road and through the Reserve.

The obvious chain of events is for boat users to launch at the boat ramp and then bring their vehicle(s) and trailer over to Little Kaiteriteri and park up in the reserve with spill over onto Rowling Road and the waterfront road at the eastern end.

Trailer parking is restricted at main Kaiteriteri already. It is almost certain boaties will seize the parking opportunity at Little Kaiteriteri.

We regularly observe vehicles (and increasingly boat trailers this summer) entering the western end of the reserve at speed on the roadway that passes very closely to the pedestrian access track to the beach. Beach users and commonly unattended children spill off the walking track on to the dirt roadway and are confronted by unseen oncoming traffic.

It is not only day visitors at fault. We have seen shuttle support vans offend at times. Large buses also try to manoeuvre a turn in this area with family groups milling nearby.

viii. Boat trailer park concerns.

it will take only 3 or 4 vehicles with boat trailers attached to block and clog up day visitors access to parking on the Reserve. We have seen it happen this past summer. First are almost always boaties and they encapture the shade trees and block access further into the reserve.

Increased vehicle patronage by the boaties support crews will add to the traffic volumes and limited parking. We are not against persons parking in the Reserve but boat trailers bring a new problem. We have seen a front row of cars and trailers and no one able to access the parking areas beyond. Believe it or not you can count on someone to take the last spot (gap) and ruin it for others.

vix. Family groups and unattended children Family group and unattended children frequent the reserve and walk through the onto the beach access track. They do so without hesitation and with an awareness of only light traffic activity through the reserve. Often young children will run ahead and not be aware of the danger of oncoming vehicles along the roadway.

x. Speed and Toilet signage.

These need to be increased in the Alex Ryder Reserve regardless.

Increased water dangers

Ine Harbourmaster will be hard pressed to eliminate all swimmers from both the ski access lane and the stretch of beach proposed between the ski access lane and designated swimming area at the eastern end.

We know boats will anchor up and beach along the whole of Little Kaiteritor beach with the changes proposed. By the Navigation laws themselves they cannot anchor within the ski access lane or beach for any length of time so they will spill over to the rest of the beach.

Assessment:

Effectively you are giving over the whole of the beach to powerboats for skiing and further access by the larger shuttle boats.

You are pushing owners and users away from a beach frontage use that they desired when purchasing properties. Why should property owners be forced down to one end of the beach to accommodate a ski access lane that is neither necessary nor wanted by users and residents.

The dynamics will change for the worst with the introduction of a ski access lane to Little Kaiteriteri. This is a passive, safe, motorboat free beach frequented by family groups, holidaymakers, locals and retirees and is known the world over for these features.

2. PUBLIC NUISANCE

As we understand it the Bylaws will allow for waterskiing to take place between 0600hrs and through to dusk, ie for all the daylight hours available.

We object strongly to being confronted with vehicle and boat trailer traffic awaking and disturbing the peace at 0600 hours. This will happen with vehicles entering the reserve from that time onwards. It already happens now at times over the busy periods and it is a definite disturbance.

The reserve is 5 or 6 metres from our bedroom. Vehicles often park directly outside our gate on to the Reserve. Other nearby residents are also affected.

We will also be confronted with car doors closing, voices (often loud as what do they care for the residents?) and noisy activity. Vehicles will come and go. Overall activity will increase noticeably. This is a residential area of permanent and holiday homes. Those on Rowling Road and the side roads will also be adversely affected. Traffic volumes will increase in general.

Following on we will be then hammered by boat noise through takeoffs, restarts, circuits and all the hubbub that goes with waterskiing. No resident at main Kaiteriteri is subject this nuisance level now so why should we be. Particuarly it will be notably more heightened at compact Little Kaiteriteri . Not to mention the loud inboard river boats that noise pollute the community each summer.

All these matters are already self contained and ingrained at main Kaiteriteri with every resource applied to cope with every activity - why change the status quo. Neither I nor any other property owner in Little Kaiteriteri brought into the area with a wish for the beach characteristics to change as the bylaws proposed intend.

We are forever losing our views and panorama that first attracted us to the area, due to minimal spending on the foreshore and reserve, and to this you wish to add noise and traffic pollution.

Assessment.

it is an outrage the new Navigation Bylaws are even being considered.

The main Kalteriteri ski arrangements are working. Increased boat and swimmer activity is tricted to just a few weeks a year. Why would you wish too defile a world renown and loved stretch of beach.

These bylaw proposals will change the beach's character forever and for what? A poorly thought out proposal without regards for the loss of enjoyment and public safety implications for users.

While it is appreciated that Tasman District Council must replace the existing Navigation Safety Bylaw made under Section 684B of the Local Government Act 1974, and to replace it with new Navigation Bylaws under Section 33N of the Maritime Transport Act 1994, as a result of the repeal of the relevant provisions to the Local Government Act, it is noticed that the import of the Statement of Proposal including the details of the proposed bylaws include provisions for a water ski lane at Little Kalteriteri where none presently exist.

Throughout the proposed bylaw and its schedules, that is, sections 5a (the Traverse), 5d (south east Rabbit Island) - Schedules 2 & 8, there have been "high speed activity areas" identified.

Priority for vessels/use is listed as follows:

- 1. Personal watercraft
- 2. Hovercraft, WIG and novel craft
- 3. Vessels engaged in waterskiing
- 4. Other vessels undertaking trials in excess of 5 knots.

The Friends have concerns about the types of vessel that could fall under either "novel craft" or the "other vessels" categories. We have seen instances where amateur "hydrofoil"-type vessels have caused disturbance to estuarine edges by destroying saltmarsh communities, modifying wildlife habitats and causing erosion; stirring up sediments on the estuary bottom and disturbing wildlife, particularly birds. Waimea Injet is the largest enclosed Inlet in the South Island. "At risk" species include banded rail, Australasian bittern and marsh crake (estuary edges), white herons, Royal spoonbill and little egret.

An ecological report on Waimea Inlet (Department of Conservation, Davidson & Moffat 1990) recommended that powerboating on the estuary should be prohibited with passive recreation promoted, in a management plan, to ensure that conflicts of use are avoided. The Report also notes that "powerboating, jetskis and hovercraft" be restricted to particular areas of the estuary. While 24 years has passed since the writing of this report, no management plan has eventuated or any obvious and practical protection resulted (the Waimea Charter contains no practical protection). Recreation has increased exponentially with the consequence that the natural values of the Waimea Inlet have been even further degraded.

Further, it is somewhat ironic that Schedule 8 describes the reasons for the 200 metre prohibition for these high speed activities (although notably NOT including "novel craft" and "trials") on the beach side of Rabbit island is to avoid "spooking" or horses, and yet no such buffers are formally applied to other areas important for wildlife for example the Bells Island shellbanks (including eastern bar-tailed godwit, South island pied oystercatcher).

We wish to ensure that the definitions of vessels does not include vessels that are noisy, or likely to cause the type of disturbance as described. We submit that the description "novel craft" be deleted and that controls are advised on the decibel rating of vessels in the high speed activity areas.

Also we respectfully submit that:

a. prior to any extensions/changes to these high speed activity areas, consultation be undertaken with the local branch of the Ornithological Society of NZ (OSNZ). and b. that a management plan and/or better protection of the natural values of the Waimea Inlet be instituted by Tasman District Council.



Submission on TDC Draft Navigational Bylaws

I wish to submit on Schedule relating to Bylaw 3.25.2 where anchoring is prohibited. I do not believe the proposed changes are viable considering current use, and safety for all users, specifically for the Torrent Bay Area.

- I support the Access Point Transit Lane for Torrent Bay at the southern end of the beach when tide permits.
- I absolutely do not support the installation of an Access Point Transit Lane at the northern end of the beach. The area around Ballons Rock and Glasgows Beach is a safe anchoring area for small boats, in particular at mid to low tide when they cannot access the lagoon. It is also a well used area for recreation. To restrict anchoring time, and dictate that anchoring is just for pickup and drop off is the only use of that area allowed, represent a significant change from accepted current use. In addition, signally this area as a transit lane implies priority as that and I believe based on extensive observations of behaviour in the area, that this would place recreational users' safety at risk (regardless of the small print asking vessel operators to keep a look out for them). The only viable option I believe for a low tide access point at the northern end of the beach is for the approach to be allowed from the southern side of Ballons rock to the low tide mark, and that this must be dealt with as a multi-use area, appreciating that no one type of user has priority at this end of the beach inside Ballons Rock.

I support the restriction against sea plane landing in the Abel Tasman National Park, Foreshore and adjacent marine area.

I support the increased time for waterskiing allowed in this bylaw change.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit on the draft navigation bylaws I would be pleased for you to consider the following points in making changes to the bylaws.

- 1. Tata Beach Ski Lane. Map 5. The rules are constantly breached not only by skiers, boaties, canoeists and swimmers. So many close calls occur it is only a matter of time before their another serious injury or loss of life.
- 1.1 The separation between ski lane and non motorised area Blue needs to be at least 50 meter. So boats can park out of ski lane.
- 1.1.1 The non motorized area could be reduced as they also have the right over all the beach and can also transit the ski lane.
- 1.2 The ski lane needs to be 50 meters from the boat ramp.
- 1.3 The Harbor Master needs to have a presence to educate and enforce. I would like to know how many times a visit occurred last summer?, from my recollections may be twice at Tata Beach.
- 1.4 The Harbor Manager at Tarakohe could be part contracted to act as a Harbor master for the area over the 6 week summer period.
- 1.5 The TDC must recognize that Tata beach is the only Water ski beach in Golden Bay, boats can transit close to the beach in any tide. Put your limited time and finances in to one place and that is Tata.
- 1.6 Place a restriction on water skiing times similar to Kaiterteri. Alternatively maybe no water skiing prior to 8am and no waterskiing after 7 pm.
- 1.7 A dedicated anchoring area should be set aside to reduce user conflict with yachts mooring to close to the ski lane.
- 2.Pakawau map 1 and Parapara map2. Very difficult place to water ski due to the extreme tidal range. The ski lane will get little use as it is difficult to launch and retrieve a ski boat with no formed ramp. The areas are not known as a desired place for water skiing and may be only used for a short period due to the holiday season. Visitors who holiday in Golden Bay go to Pohara/ Tata side of the Bay for water sports and the west side is where you go if you want more peace and quite. Water ski lanes are also miss understood and are treated by water craft owners as a place where you can drive at maximum speed whether towing or not. People in the west of Golden Bay have an easy commute to Tata which has a very good launching ramp with Port Tarakohe available in all weather.
- 3. Ligar Bay Inner section from the power line north should be zoned exclusion of all motorized vessels. Ligar Bay is a delicate ecosystem and is the habitat for many native birds including the rare Banded Rail. Often water skiers and small power craft will transit the inner part of the lagoon and in particular when the westerly is pushing the sea up it is not uncommon to have a number of boats powering at speed in the lagoon in conflict with other users. Please put some restriction and signs in place.
- 4. Please put a paid Harbor Master in Golden Bay for several days each week during the 6 weeks Holiday period.



- 1. At the Monday night public meeting the harbour master indicated that he was proposing to make a 25 metre mooring lane on the Northern side of the ski lane.
 - 2. Having observed how boats use this area the area would need to be up to 100 metres wide, at least. When boats are not skiing, or returning from fishing, or a family picnic a number of boats can be moored in this area.
 - 3. It is a popular area for families as they can park and walk to this area for swimming etc.
 - 4. The proposal for a non power boat area as shown on Map 5 on the northern side of the proposed mooring lane I would support but not on the size indicated on the map. To Whom It May Concern: Re Submission For Tata Beach (Northern End), All power driven vehicles are prohibited at all times.

We certainly don't agree with this proposed change, in our experience of holidaying on the beachfront at 13 b Cornwall Place for 35 years, we have never seen any reason to be concerned or alter the status quo.

If a change was to be made, we could see the benefit of a narrow area close to the northeast shoreline for swimmers and non-motor vessels to use to access to the islands or around the point on the Wainui side.

The proposal TDC wants to restrict is far to big an area and to our thinking is not warranted, as it is already a 5-knot area.

In fact, the most dangerous activity we see is non motorized vessels and swimmers using the ski lane, that is consistently a dangerous risk, we have never cited any risk with moored or landing vessels in that northern area.

As regular uses of that area we feel that we represent a large range of possible uses. We have a kayak, motor vessel as well as Stephen who swims around the island most days starting from the northern beach. 

The beach and surrounding area is already congested at peak times affecting pedestrian safety from vehicle and traffic volumes.

The existing reserve would become a trailer park to the detriment of families and picnickers and in contravention of the original intended right of use of the reserve.

Erosion control has been a problem in the past and recently completed plantings would be at risk of being destroyed due to increased numbers of people accessing the beach from parking and roadways.

Wind and wave action on Little Kaiteri beach from prevailing NE & N summer sea breezes is far greater than that at Kaiteri main beach meaning it is unsafe for motorised water sports.

Local residents assist in maintaining and protecting Little Kaiteri beach and its surrounding environment from damage to the environment, rubbish strewn around and water hazards causing danger to swimmers and other passive users.

Having utilised Little Kaiteri and Kaiteri Bay for holidays and family enjoyment over the past 55 years we consider the proposed changes of use to Little Kaiteri Beach would be detrimental to the environment, the overall charm of Kalteri Bay, the current wide range of users and more importantly the families and children of the future.

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

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

I wish to object to the proposed water skiing access lane at Little Kaiteriteri.

Little Kaiteriteri has become increasingly popular with families and the general public for a relaxing day out free from the noise pollution and recreational activities that occur at the main Kaiteriteri Beach. The proposed access lane would appear to be sited in an area that attracts many picnic groups who enjoy picnicing, swimming, kayaking and now paddle boarding there. To describe water sking as an enjoyable spectator sport would be anathema to these people. It is largely only a spectacle to those waiting their turn to ski.

Water skiing is a very noisy sport with some boats being overwhelmingly noisy and this noise already can be very disturbing, particularly in the early hours of the morning, to residents in Little Kaiteriteri. To have it operating from their own beach would magnify the impact on residents as it is surprising just how far noise carries upwards from the bay.

Little Kaiteriteri has become more and more residential area with property owners enjoying the tranquility of the area and the non-commercialisation of the beach. The proposal would clearly impact on their enjoyment of the bay. In season there are keen waterskiers residing in the community here and certainly all that I know prefer to ski from beaches within the Abel Tasman National Park or even in the Kina area as they maintain the onshore swells created by the perpetual northerly and north easterly winds in the summer months make Little Kaiteriteri an unsafe area for skiing.

No thought appears to have been given to the provision of adequate parking in Little Kaiteriteri as almost certainly skiers would launch their boats and then drive to the access fane, where the additional influx of cars and trailers would tax parking facilities, scarcely adequate currently and certainly inadequate around the New Year period and the picnic reserve should not be sacrificed for water skiing parking.

The bank above the area of the proposed skiing access lane is very fragile now and often eroded by stormy high tides and will certainly not survive the continual foot traffic likely to be generated by the water skiing fraternity.

Partial Support - changes and/or additions required

Reasons: We strongly believe the time has come to designate Little Kaiteriteri waters (out 200m from shore) as non-motorised in their entirety. People gravitate to Little Kaiteriteri for safer, quieter and less congested swimming/paddling/skim boarding often from the Main Kaiteriteri beach. We feel the area from the Kaiteriteri Lagoon outlet all the way south to the southern end of Little Kaiteriteri beach should be Anchoring Prohibited, Power Craft Prohibited, Water Skiing Prohibited, and designated as a reserved Swimming Area with non-motorised crafts allowed as well. Mixed use (motorised/non-motorised) is a recipe for accidents/injuries and it's just a matter of time before there is a serious collision.

Little Kaiteriteri offers poor anchoring but we often see craft that have moored just off shore. Make Little Kaiteriteri Anchoring Prohibited.

Concentrate motorised craft use (commercial and private) in the vicinity of the Main Kaiteriteri beach, restrict commercial craft from accessing the beach south of the Kaiteriteri Lagoon outlet especially at King low tides, and draw a line from the lagoon outlet south to the southern end of Little Kaiteriteri beach, 200m out from shore, for passive, non-motorised use. 


Figure 19: Kaiteriteri Bay - Map 15

1. No evidence has been provided by the Council that additional skl access lanes are required in Golden Bay. The only rationale provided by council for this proposal has been based on the "impression" (ref: Takaka 10 March 2014) for additional skl access lanes, based on an unstated number of observations of water skling at unpermitted locations in Golden Bay. In the absence of any documented and/or quantifiable need for a change to the existing bylaws (location of skl access lanes), then the status quo position should remain.

(Note: As a personal comment on "Impressions" of need for additional ski access lanes; in seven years of permanent residency at Parapara and as a regular user of the beach, I have personally observed NO occasion of water skling at Parapara Beach. However this is not infrequently observed at beaches between Wainui Bay and Taupo Point, at the eastern part of Golden Bay where public use (particularly water craft activity) is centred (see Point 7 below).

- 2. Little or no consultation with residents of the affected communities has been carried out to ascertain the potential adverse impacts of increased power-boat use of these areas (ref: Takaka 10 March 2014). No assessment process of evaluating the adverse impacts against perceived user benefits has been described by the council, except for the priority basis of "maritime safety". Therefore the consideration of any affects that are more than minor cannot be determined. This is an unacceptable basis for such a proposal.
- 3. The absence of ski access lanes at any of these sites does not preclude or greatly impinge on this activity (compliance only with the 200m /5 knot zone). Therefore there is no loss of any current use/benefit compared to the increased adverse impacts of such a proposal on the broader community (beach residents, visitors).
- The proposed ski access lane is directly off-shore from the Parapara Reserve which one of the two primary bathing areas for non-residents (visitors). Child playground facilities have recently been installed at this Reserve, thereby encouraging use of this and the adjacent beach/shore area by children. This is therefore clearly counter to the stated primary aim of increased water safety.

The proposed Parapara site is adjacent to an area identified by TDC as a shorebird protection area with both nesting and high tide roosting areas. The concentrated effect of increased power boat use (and type) is inconsistent with the TDC recognition of the value of this area.

6. The Parapara site is exposed to frequent and strong southwest-north west winds making this site unattractive and unsuitable as a water ski site compared to alternative, viable sites elsewhere (e.g. see Point 8)

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- 7. The stated strategy of "dispersal" of water ski opportunities away from Tata Beach to relieve pressure at this location to "strategic positions" (ref: Takaka 10 March 2014) elsewhere in Golden Bay would be more effective by locating such a site(s) as close as practicable to high public use areas of Takaka and Pohara where the majority of seasonal water ski activity is based. Alternative sites which provide the same boat and shore facilities as the two proposed sites are present at locations closer to the primary source of seasonal recreational boating in Golden Bay (Tata—Pohara).
- 8. Alternative, more suitable ski access sites are clearly available for consideration *IF* the need for additional ski access lanes can be fully documented and justified, including, but not limited to:
 - a) Patons Rock
 - Considerably closer to the primary areas of high seasonal (boating) visitor occupancy (Tata-Pohara)
 - ii) Existing shorefront public reserves for parking with toilet facilities.
 - iii) More protected site from SW winds compared to high exposure at Pakawau and (notably) Parapara.
 - iv) Low density/set-back beach properties (north end of beach) resulting in lower resident impacts
 - v) No sensitive shorebird roosting nesting areas (as present at Parapara).

ANNEXURE TO SUBMISSION IN RELATION TO STATEMENT OF PROPOSAL - NAVIGATION BYLAWS

1. Generai

While it is appreciated that Tasman District Council must replace the existing Navigation Safety Bylaw made under Section 684B of the Local Government Act 1974, and to replace it with new Navigation Bylaws under Section 33N of the Maritime Transport Act 1994, as a result of the repeal of the relevant provisions to the Local Government Act, it is noticed that the import of the Statement of Proposal including the details of the proposed bylaws include provisions for a water ski lane at Little Kalteriteri where none presently exist.

2. Position of the Ski Lane

A proposed ski lane has been proposed:

- (i) Directly in front established homes, many of which are lived in permanently;
- (ii) In an area where there is little (and even what is there constrained) access by vehicle to the area of proposed ski lane, and no turning area;
- (III) The Little Kalteriteri beach has always historically been the "swimmers beach" and "passive activities beach" with main Kalteriteri being the "commercial beach", the "activity beach" and the "active activities beach".







Figure 19: Kalteriteri Bay - Map 15

The proposal contained in the bylaws and Figure 19 will have the effect of turning Little Kalteriteri beach into another "active activity beach" in large parts.

3. Effect of Proposed Ski Lane

- (a) Whilst the proposal reserves some area of beach for swimmers and passive activities it:
- (I) Takes almost a % of the beach for powered (water ski) craft;
- (ii) Takes water skiling access ianes out of the "commercial" area at main Kaiteriteri which is in close proximity to the boat ramp and dumps water skiling all (for the whole of both Kaiteriteri's) into Little Kaiteriteri (in the context of Kaiteriteri Bay as a whole);
- (III) Provides for a ski lane in an area where Little Blue Penguins come ashore and the presence of a water ski access lane where proposed pays scant regard to the interest of those and will lead to adverse impact upon them.;
- (iv) Will have a major impact on residents of Little Kalteriteri who wish to use the beach for pick up and drop off family (but not waterskiing) from in front of their houses thereby taking pressure off main Kaiteriteri.

- (i) Little Kalteriteri has prevailing afternoon Northerly sea breeze and often accompanied by a swell / surf like wave action more often than not impossible to offload friends / family from watercraft small to medium boats even kayaking at times can be challenging. This summer alone we witnessed 3 boats become side on in the surf and were swamped. We witness many people jumping off their watercraft in to waist deep water b/c the swell is too large to land any closer to the beach it is incredibly dangerous
- (ii) We ourselves have a 6.5m powerboat and we ourselves do NOT load/offload passengers at Little Kai we drive/walk around to Kaiteriteri boat ramp where it is sheltered and safe how can skiing be contemplated at all at Little Kaiteriteri someone will be injured if not killed.

- (iii) Little Kaiteriteri is a SAFE haven for families in particular with children, for swimming, paddie boarding, kayaking and the like introducing any water ski/board activity will be treacherous SAFETY is the key issue and any change to the current location will jeopardise the safety of ALL users of the water in Kaiteriteri as it will cause "cross traffic" at right angles across the bay the current situation works outgoing commercial operators and skiers travel parallel and it is safe proposing the lane in Little Kaiteriteri will mean this traffic will cross
- (iv) The residents at Little Kalteriteri have invested there because of the 'passive and peaceful nature' of the beach and its surroundings most owners are middle aged or older and many have young families / grandchildren. The main Kalteriteri beach has traditionally been the 'busy hub' for commercial uses and active recreation for boats, skiers and biscuiting.
- (v) The existing location of the ski lane is NOT unsafe and works why change it. We ourselves go over the main ski lane to ski as it is simply not safe to begin from Little Kalteriteri beach

(c) Erosion Control:

Kaiteriteri Domain Board in conjunction with TDC has spent thousands (along with ratepayers volunteers to help plant) planting out the foreshore to protect it from further erosion and directing pedestrians in order to protect these plantings. Additional wake from power boats will erode further the beach at the front and the additional people and foot traffic on the foreshore will destroy what has been so well prepared.

(d) Penguin Life/Bird Life:

Residents, in particular the children enjoy the birdlife and penguins who live all along the beachfront in burrows along the foreshore of Little Kaiterliteri — they are known to nest in the planted areas but also under residents decks and in gardens. The little blue penguins are often swimming in the water alongside paddle boarders and kayakers in the waters in front of the Little Kaiterliteri Beach

Penguins avoid people – so moving the ski lane to Little Kalteriteri will 'destroy' this habitat and environment.

(e) Traffic/Pollution & Rubbish/Lack of Services

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



Figure 19: Kaiteriteri Bay - Map 15

Please find enclosed our submission regarding the Draft Navigation by Laws, and in particular By Law 3.3 relating to Kaiteriteri Bay (Figure 19/Map 15).

My family own a holiday home at Little Kaiteriteri where we spend some considerable time in both summer and winter and consequently I believe I can comment sensibly with many years of experience of this area.

I will comment specifically on Little Kaiteriteri with some further comments about water skiing in the Bay.

In general Little Kaiteriteri beach is a safe, pleasant beach which caters summer and winter for families, older residents and visitors, it is a place where children can play safely in the water without the fear and danger of boats and water skiiers, it is also a place where children and even adults can learn safely to paddle board and kayak away from the congested main beach.

SWIMMING AREA

We have spent considerable time as earlier indicated at Little Kaiteriteri and the area designated for swimming is very rarely used, many rocks to the west of Torlesse Rock as well as low water levels, the area to the east I can't recall a swimmer ever swimming there it is very difficult to get too, parents would never allow their children to swim in that area as they couldn't be seen and whoever has designated this area as safe for swimming has never spent any time at Little Kaiteriteri. The main swimming area is and has always been from the western edge of the present designated area through to the western edge of the proposed access lane for water skiing.

My submission is to cancel the part of the designated swimming area to the east of Torlesse Rock and extend the western edge through to the western edge of the access lane for water skiing as outlined in red on the map attached used

for the planned access lane for water skiing, based on this submission above I believe the access lane for water skiing should be deleted all together as having two access lanes for water skiing obviously increases the danger, does nothing at all to improve the safety of swimmers being swept out the lagoon but does increase the danger to people on Little Kaiteriteri beach.

The facilities at Little Kaiteriteri beach cannot cope with the extra volumes that would occur if the access lane for water skiing was identified there, there is not sufficient car parking and the noise levels from ski boats setting off from that beach because of its topography would resonate throughout the properties all the way up to the crest in Little Kaiteriteri.
