HEALTHY BOOST FOR SANDSPIT

The re-planting of Motupipi sandspit has received a boost from a makeover expert of a different kind.

Collingwood company HealthPost, which sells natural health and skincare products by mail-order, gave its 18 staff time off on 9 April 2010 to plant trees on the sandspit, which is gradually being restored by Coastcare.

Tasman District Council works with Coastcare, plus the Department of Conservation, on foreshore restoration throughout Golden Bay.

Rob Lewis, of Coastcare, says the HealthPost plantings at Motupipi included kanuka, ake-ake, karamu, harakeke (flax) and cabbage trees, with the seedlings bedded in deep, to tap moisture. Each received a boost of fertiliser.

The area involved was difficult to access and its previous covering of gorse had been burnt out last October, he said.

Rob called the day a "giving to nature" that will benefit plants, birds, skinks, spiders, invertebrates, and of course, humans. Motupipi offered a rare chance to establish a coastal forest without impeding anyone's views, he said.

Coastcare has an annual budget of about \$50,000, and with a hefty input from volunteers, is working on projects from Tata Beach to Pakawau.

HealthPost has become one of Golden Bay's biggest employers since the business began as a sole-trader in 1988. Director Peter Butler says a dollar from each order is given to one of three charitable causes, with customers nominating their pick. More than \$3000 has been donated so far. Red Cross tops the list, followed by the Fred Hollows Foundation and the Motupipi project.

CALLING ALL USERS OF KAITERITERI AND TOTARANUI BEACHES

Tasman District Council Harbourmaster, Steve Hainstock, wants to hear from anyone who uses Kaiteriteri beach or Totaranui beach for swimming, paddling or waterskiing to work out the best way to keep these often incompatible activities safely separated.

Feedback will be summarised and officially presented to Council for further discussion.

"A two-month trial was carried out at Kaiteriteri beach during the summer school holidays at the lagoon outlet, replacing the buoys that mark the boundary between the water ski area and the powered-craft prohibited area with an inflatable safety boom. A decision on whether this becomes a regular installation during peak holiday periods will be made before next summer. The location is dictated by the Bylaw, but any comments residents have regarding signage, or the boom's effectiveness, safety or design are welcomed," said Steve.

"At Totaranui Beach the Department of Conservation has requested that the existing waterski lane be relocated to the southern end of the beach. This is driven by a rising number of near misses where swimmers and kayakers have passed through or remained in the waterski access lane while water skiing was in progress. The proposed location is more sheltered from north-west conditions, but slightly more exposed to the sea breeze."

COLLINGWOOD BOAT RAMP REVAMP



The Collingwood Boat Club handed a \$25,000 cheque to Mayor Richard Kempthorne at the opening of the boat ramp reclamation – as part of its contribution to the project.

Boaties can now access the ramp from Williams Street, rather than through the campground. The area has space for trailer parking and is landscaped with shrubs.

Mayor Kempthorne cut the ribbon on the Tasman District Council project on Wednesday 7 April 2010, at a ceremony attended by Council officials, representatives from the boat club, Councillors and Golden Bay Community Board, plus locals.

Admiral Collingwood himself attended the event. An impressive effigy of the naval commander – who directed the Battle of Trafalgar after Lord Nelson was killed – sailed into the proceedings on the deck of a local launch.



POHARA TO HAVE NEW SHARED PATH AND SEAWALL

Fulton Hogan has been awarded the contract to rebuild the Pohara seawall and widen that section of Abel Tasman Drive for a shared path for pedestrians and cyclists.

The path will make the journey from the campground to the Pohara Hall safer.

The \$340,000 Tasman District Council project involves reconstructing the seawall in local natural rock and building the path next to the road on the seaward side, from the reserve opposite the Penguin Cafe to the grass verge near the hall.

The new path will go around the historic band rotunda, which had its

foundation stone laid on 3 November 1935 by N L Bensemann, the Conductor of Takaka Citizen Band.


The initial plan would have meant cutting back the wing wall of the structure. However, at a meeting last month at the Pohara Hall, interested groups asked for the bandstand to remain intact. Those concerns have been heeded and it was decided to narrow the path to 1.4m – almost half the normal width – where it passes the rotunda.

Heritage Golden Bay is applying for historic status for the band rotunda.

Once the new path is finished, a timber kerb rail will separate it from the roadway to stop drivers from straying on to, or parking in, the path.

Work should be completed by June 2010, planned to cause the least disruption to the penguin breeding cycle.

A selection of Nelson-Tasman's premier high school bands have hit the highway on their quest to rock the region during the Tasman Band Tour.

The Tasman Band Tour is a region-wide youth music series, providing up and

coming high school bands with an opportunity to perform live, as a lead-in to Smokefreerockquest.

The line-up covers a bit of something for everyone, ranging from acoustic folk duos and hardcore punk groups to 'good old no nonsense' rock bands. Events are drug and alcohol free and tickets are available at the door for just \$5.00.

The tour is sponsored by Tasman District Council as part of the Council's commitment to providing creative outlets for young people to contribute to their local communities. The tour will utilise the

services of youth-focussed/friendly community organisations HYPE-GS and the Whakatu Maori Wardens to provide support staff at each of the events.

TASMAN YOUTH MAG WINS NATIONAL AWARD

The Tasman Youth Council has scooped a national award for its quarterly youth magazine, JAM.

The award was announced at the Youth in Local Government Conference held in Wellington in April. Youth projects entered for the awards were evaluated on criteria such as participation, collaboration, connection and good practice.

Judges said JAM showed "clear collaboration through the whole process. It is fantastically resourced and has tangible results. Not only does it provide an avenue for young people to communicate to one another, it focuses on upskilling and sustainability."

Tasman District Council Community Recreation Officer Paul McConachie said winning the award was a real coup for the Tasman Youth Council team and it was a reflection of the hard work the Youth Council members had put into the publication.

"The teams that we've had working on the magazine particularly in the past year have done an awesome job in ensuring that the content is relevant and interesting to local youth and also that it looks great."

Paul McConachie said Councils sometimes found it difficult to get input from young people, and publications such as JAM were a great way for young people to share their ideas, raise issues and ensure that their voices were heard.

"It is important to provide creative outlets for young people to contribute to their local communities, and JAM Magazine enables young people across the region to connect, share and learn from one another."

JAM Magazine was officially launched in September 2004. It grew out of a need voiced by youth for an events guide for young people in the Nelson-Tasman region. Since its inception, it's grown into a glossy snapshot of what it's like



to be young and growing up in Nelson-Tasman. Now in its 15th edition, the magazine offers young people a media outlet where they can express their views creatively and be heard. JAM Magazine is written by young people, for young people and provides them with the opportunity to learn new skills in a supportive environment. With each issue, young people have the chance to take on different roles including brainstorming ideas, acting as editor, chief reporter, graphic designer or photographers and assisting with promotion and distribution.

There is definitely room for improving the management of rural fires to help reduce the problem of smoke

It is the time of the year when the debate about the level of smoke being caused by rural fires starts up again. Council recognises the use of fire as an important land management tool as long as smoke levels do not cause significant adverse effects. Mayor Richard Kempthorne is calling for operators to raise their standards and manage fires better to reduce the problems caused by smoke. "We know smoke can't always be avoided" he says, "But we also know fires can be better managed to reduce the amount of smoke they generate" Council published clear good practice guidelines to reduce smoke from outdoor fires, in conjunction with a set of explicit rules controlling outdoor burning. These

guidelines are available on Councils website and in hard copy from its offices. It expects operators to adopt these measures.

Council has had to adopt very restrictive rules in urban areas, especially in Richmond, to manage adverse effects of smoke from domestic wood burners and is working hard to ensure that rural fires are managed in a similar way.

Where a fire is causing significant smoke problems, especially where the fire is badly managed, Council will take enforcement action. This can include infringement fines or notices requiring the fire to be put out.

MAPUA CAUSEWAY GAINS MORE FLOOD PROTECTION

Work to allow considerably more water to drain out of the inner estuary from Seaton Valley Stream during peak flood events is about to start.

A new culvert is to be installed to prevent the accumulation of water behind the causeway structure during flooding events.

The new 1350mm diameter culvert with a flap gate will be installed underneath Toru Street Causeway in Mapua. In addition to the new culvert, the Council will also install a flap gate onto the one of the existing 900mm diameter culverts.

During the works, to minimise the effect to the environment, a temporary bund will be constructed within the estuary around the

new culvert. It is expected that at times during the construction the contractor will have equipment in the estuary adjacent to the works.

The work will be undertaken by Tasman Civil between 26 April 2010 and 21 May 2010, weather dependent. Pedestrian access will be available for the majority of the times, as will emergency vehicles if required during the construction period.

DOG REGISTRATION 2010

Dog registrations expire in June of each year and anyone who keeps a dog aged three months or older is required to register their dog no later than 1 July 2010.

However, Council allows an additional period until 31 July 2010 to make an application and pay the normal urban or rural fee without penalty.

Registration forms for all dogs currently on Council's database will be posted at the end of May 2010. If you have moved from another area,

or have changed address within the Tasman area, please contact your nearest Council office to update the dog database information by 12 May 2010.

Forms for updating change of address or owner details are available from all Council offices or on the website www.tasman.govt.nz. The form should be completed and sent to Council as soon as possible so that the local and national dog databases can be amended before the annual registration forms are printed. Alternatively, email dogcontrol@tasman.govt.nz giving your updated details.

The fee for dogs that have not been registered by 1 August 2010 will increase by 50% on top of the standard urban or rural registration fee.

Urban Dog – Late fee (paid after 31 July 2010)	\$70.50
Rural Dog for a dog living on a property that is one hectare or more	\$29.00

Impounding Fees for 2010/2011:

1st Impounding	\$67.00
Neutered Dog	\$35.00
2nd Impounding	\$82.50
Neutered Dog	\$48.00
3rd and subsequent Impoundings	\$105.00
Neutered Dog	\$60.00
Sustenance – charged per day	\$13.50
Microchipping impounded dogs when required	\$25.00
Drop off fee where dog is not impounded	\$30.00

Upon application to Council a \$30.00 refund applies to a dog that is de-sexed during the registration year following its impounding.

Kennel Licence Fees for 30 September 2010 to 01 October 2011 (for more than the permitted number of dogs on a property outside an urban area):

Initial Application	\$95.00
Annual Renewal	\$35.00



MICROCHIPPING

The Dog Control Act 1996 also requires all dogs registered for the first time in New Zealand to be microchipped. The only exception to the microchip requirement are working dogs, used solely or principally for the herding and driving of stock.

The Act also requires all previously unregistered dogs to be microchipped as well as those classified as either Menacing or Dangerous.

 $Dog\ owners\ must\ provide\ Council\ with\ the\ verification\ certificate$

from their vet or Nelson SPCA so that the microchip number is added to your dog's record on both Council's Database and the National Dog Database. This enables Dog Control Officers around the country to easily trace the owner if any dog goes astray. There is no extra charge for adding this microchip number to the National Dog Database.

Tasman District Council Navigation Safety Bylaw 2005: Reservation of Waimea Inlet between Rabbit Island and Bell Island between Monday 10 May and Thursday 3 June 2010

MWH are undertaking the replacement of the rising sewer main between Rabbit Island and Bell Island on behalf of Tasman District Council. This work will require trenching across the channel between the islands, and at times may require the closure of part of the channel to the public for safety reasons.

Pursuant to powers provided to the Harbourmaster by the Tasman District Council Navigation Safety Bylaw, exclusive use of a reserved area is provided for this work. The area exclusively reserved will include all of the water from the Rabbit Island boat ramp eastwards approximately 820m to the line formed by a pair of existing black and white banded posts on Rabbit Island. The reserved area will therefore include part of the water skiing and personal water craft areas.

For the dates and times detailed above, the contractors undertaking the rising main replacement shall have exclusive use of the area defined above. If the site is active, vessels wishing to transit through or enter the reserved area may do so only after consulting with site staff, and then may do so when, and under such conditions that the contractor may choose to specify. Vessels entering or within the reserved area are requested to comply with any direction so given as if it was a direction given by the Harbourmaster.

Statement of Proposal: Review of Chapter 6 of Consolidated Bylaw – Trading in Public Places

Summary of Information

This summary is made to fulfil the purposes of Sections 83(1)(a)(ii) and 89 of the Local Government Act 2002. The summary contains details of the changes proposed by the new Trading in Public Places Bylaw compared to that currently existing.

- A. These changes are as follows:
 - Removal of those activities in public places that are managed by other Council processes e.g. leases, licences to occupy, permitted activities under the TRMP, Food Hygiene Regulations requirements for Mobile Shops:
 - Inclusion of "Commercial Services" category for commercial services offered in a public place;
 - 3. An attempt has been made to use simple language in the Bylaw and thus it has been substantially rewritten and reduced in size from the 2005 version, however the intent remains the same.




MOTUEKA FLOOD CONTROL SUBMISSIONS SOUGHT
