Diverted travel poses challenges

The closure of State Highway 1 through Kaikoura has led to a big increase in traffic through the communities of Murchison and St Arnaud.

The large numbers of people, cars and trucks has come with flow-on effects – some positive and some challenging – for these areas of our District.

While cafes, shops and accommodation providers are experiencing an unexpected boom, services and infrastructure including public toilets and litter bins, roads and bridges are coming under additional strain.

There are also some safety concerns surfacing, particularly around schools with children biking, walking and crossing roads while negotiating this large increase in traffic, including large trucks.

We are working to relieve some of the strain on public toilets and rubbish and recycling facilities. We are also advocating on behalf of our communities with New Zealand Transport Agency, who hold responsibility for the affected state highways.

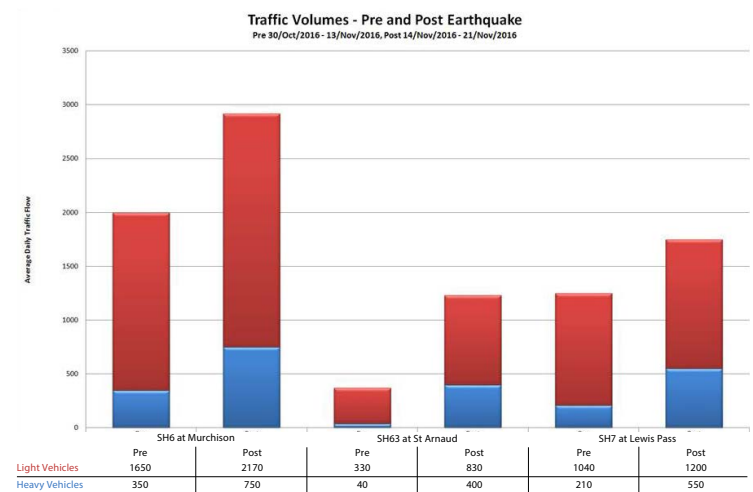
Local residents' groups, councillors, Council staff and NZTA representatives met several times last week to talk through the issues and we're hoping to have some solutions in place quickly.

NZTA has already installed new signage directing trucks not to use engine brakes in the townships, and warning of narrow roads and the need to take extra care. Its contractor, Tasman Journeys, has also stationed a crew permanently in St Arnaud to respond quickly to road maintenance needs.

NZTA is considering extra measures including speed limit changes, local schools and built-up areas, parking restrictions, additional truck stop areas and work to improve visibility at one-lane bridges.

Police have also stationed additional staff in Murchison and made changes to their patrols to offer increased oversight and presence along the highway.

Our admiration and thanks to the residents of St Arnaud, Murchison and surrounding areas who have risen to the challenge brought by the earthquake of 14 November. We're committed to working with and for you to address the new reality facing us.



Mayor's Message

The recent earthquake has reminded us how much an extreme natural event can impact us all.

While most of us may not have been significantly personally affected, our hearts go out to the people of Kaikoura, Marlborough and Hurunui who have been devastated by the recent earthquakes. If we include the people of Wellington, this is a major event with significant ramifications for individuals and whole communities. The loss of life is tragic and we stand with our respective neighbouring communities to assist where possible.

I'd like to thank the staff members of Tasman District and Nelson City Councils and the 10 members of the Urban Search and Rescue Team who have just returned from Kaikoura and Marlborough assisting with the response and recovery from the earthquake.

Another group of staff from both Councils has been deployed to further assist with recovery efforts. There will be many others in our community who have been and still are involved giving direct assistance and we would all like to thank you for your efforts.

I commend our excellent Civil Defence and Emergency Management team, who are recognised across New Zealand, which gives us a tremendous preparedness to respond and recover from natural disasters.

The best way we can support our neighbouring communities is by continuing to deliver the services we provide as well as we can, and help them wherever possible.

I appreciated taking Mark Owen from the New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA) to visit communities in St Arnaud and Murchison. Residents were able to highlight the challenges they are facing with increased traffic flows and in particular, with an increased fleet of trucks on these roads. NZTA is developing contingencies for changes that can be made to ensure these roads are safe and that these challenges can be addressed for our communities. We also discussed increased Police Traffic Enforcement and the provision of public toilets, rubbish and recycling among other things.

As communities, let's be prepared to face issues promptly and work together to find solutions when the need arises.

In case you missed it...

ENVIRONMENT AND PLANNING COMMITTEE 17 NOVEMBER 2016

- Approved the 2016-17 operational plan for biosecurity and pest management in Nelson-Tasman. The plan outlines methods for controlling 62 pests in our region.
- Received an update on the Biodiversity Programme staff undertake to assess high value native habitats, seeking landowners' permission to assess the natural values of areas of private land, providing the owners with ecological reports and encouraging them to carry out active management including weed and pest control and restoration planting. So far, 504 sites have been inspected and more than 450 ecological reports signed off by landowners. Feedback from landowners has been positive.
- The Government's National Policy Statement on Urban Development Capacity will require the Council to provide enough land and infrastructure to service expected growth plus a margin of 20%.

Don't underestimate local knowledge

It's going to be a great summer for heading out on the water. Harbourmaster Dan Cairney will be out and about offering advice and help to anyone who needs it – stay safe and enjoy yourselves.

As well as arming yourself with information about the rules of the sea, it's a really good idea to take heed of local knowledge about the area you're heading into. You can find a wealth of advice and information on our website – head to www.tasman.govt.nz/boating. Some local knowledge lessons from last year's boating incidents and accidents include: **Anchors:** Last year several unattended boats washed ashore due to incorrect anchors and anchoring. Manson Supreme, Rocna and Delta-type anchors work well along the predominantly sandy Abel Tasman coastline. Tasman has one of the largest tidal ranges in the country so allow extra anchor line to compensate. **Navigation:** Several boats hit charted submerged rocks. Check your charts and understand what the navigation markers mean – this is important when navigating near shore and when out near the marine farms.

Keep up to date with changes to Tasman and Golden Bay marine farm locations and extensions on our website:

www.tasman.govt.nz/boating. It's also important to check LINZ notices to mariners: www.linz.govt.nz/sea/maritime-safety/notices-mariners.

Weather: In Tasman Bay, the sea breeze picks up during the day and produces winds of between 10 and 20 knots. This can be a problem for small boats and kayaks that have gone offshore. Real time wind speed and direction information for Tasman Bay is provided free of charge by the Cawthron Institute: www.tasman.govt.nz/link/monitoring-buoys

Note that Local VHF channels 24 (NELSPECS LTD) and 25 and 78 (Mount Campbell Communications Ltd) as well as the Nelson forecast channel were changed in this region on 1 October 2016.

- Channel 24 users will need to switch to channel 7
- Channel 25 users will need to switch to channel 4
- Channel 78 users will need to switch to channel 3
- Nelson Weather information channel 22 will be changing to channel 79
- Channel 16 (Marine Distress) remains unchanged

Harbourmaster for a day

Three young Tasman residents have won the chance to be Harbourmaster for a day, and will enjoy a trip out on the water with Tasman's Harbourmaster Dan Cairney.

The winners, Finn Timmins, 7, of Golden Bay, Gabriel Kiddle, 5, of Motueka and Eve Rucks, 10, of Richmond were among 70 children

to enter the Harbourmaster colouring competition and correctly answer a boating safety question. As well as being Harbourmaster for the day, the trio each received a new lifejacket, drink bottle and hat. Harbourmaster Dan said it was a tough job choosing winners from the great range of entries, and he was helped with judging by Tasman District Council staff.

Councils join forces for consistency in consents

Tasman District Council and Nelson City Council are among 20 councils around New Zealand about to start using the GoShift initiative to bring consistency to the building consent process.

From 5 December, Nelson City and Tasman District Councils will both be using GoShift application forms and guidance to deliver a consistent and timely consenting experience with the aim of simpler, faster building consents processes. This ensures consistency between councils that recognise many high users of the building consent process work in both Nelson and Tasman districts.

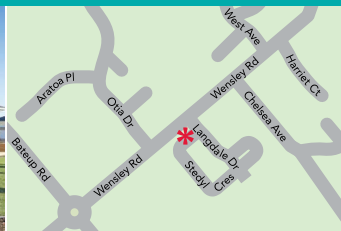
Having the new forms and processes available online is the first stage of this initiative. The next stage of GoShift will be the introduction of standardised processing checklists and approval processes, due to be introduced early next year. Further developments are likely to include a dedicated online portal to enable an easier application process and allow for data standardisation and sharing of expertise and resources.

Earthquake in Tasman – what you need to know

Just after midnight on Monday 14 November, residents of our region were among those jolted awake by a 7.8-magnitude earthquake.

Some who live near the coast, realising that the long, strong shake signalled a potential tsunami threat, headed straight for high ground. Well done – you did the right thing.

Nelson Tasman Civil Defence activated swiftly, and information and advice began flowing through local radio, online and social media channels. There has been some criticism nationally of the tsunami information provided. We will be working with MCDEM to ensure our systems are the best they can be. Natural disasters create a dynamic situation – the official information can change as more information and analysis comes to hand.

Our region was fortunate to escape with little damage from the strong shake. However, the event highlighted how unprepared some of our community are for an emergency. You are responsible for your own safety and that of your family. The key advice has not changed – be prepared. If you live in a coastal area and experience a long, strong earthquake, do not wait – head inland or to higher ground. Tsunami evacuation maps are available for our region – check whether your home is in an evacuation zone so you are prepared before disaster strikes. Find out in advance whether you are in an area at risk of tsunami. You can search for your address on the Tsunami Evacuation Maps - see www.nelsontasmancivildefence.co.nz/tsunami-evacuation-maps. There is a web-based app as well as pdfs to download if you wish.

WHAT TO DO IN AN EARTHQUAKE

Drop, cover and hold.

If you are inside, stay there. Move no more than a few steps then drop to the ground, take cover under a table or other stable object if one is close, and hold on. Doorways are no longer recommended as a place to seek cover.

If you are in bed, stay there. Hold on and protect your head with a pillow.

If you are outside, stay there. Take no more than a few steps then drop to the ground, cover your head with your arms and hold on.

DO NOT WAIT FOR A TSUNAMI WARNING SIREN

Nelson and Tasman do not operate tsunami warning sirens so if you are near the coast and experience a long or strong shake, do not wait – head inland or to high ground.

While Civil Defence staff do their best to reply to messages during an event, they may be too busy to respond immediately to individual queries. Make sure you are prepared to self-evacuate and know what to do in an emergency – before it happens.

CHECK YOUR DRAINS

Earthquakes can affect water pipes and drains around your property. You should check all your taps and water connections for leaks. This includes all your water connections at the meter and entry into the house or other buildings – whether you are on a rural or urban supply, hot water cylinders, toilets, washing machines, dishwashers and pipes. Storage tanks should also be checked – header tanks, outdoor tanks and pipes connecting to them can loosen with movement. Leaks can take time to appear so repeated checks may be necessary. To check your water connections, turn off all household appliances and outside taps – if the red numbers on your meter are still moving you have a leak. Water tanks should also be checked, especially if they have moved through the shaking, even if it is just slightly.

Conserving water is also important after natural disasters as it may take some time for normal services to be repaired.

We recommend any damage to essential services like toilets and water systems be repaired immediately. If it is part of an EQC claim you should keep, document or record everything the repairer replaces (and keep a copy of the bill). Reimbursement for any temporary repairs are subject to EQC acceptance of a valid claim.

STAY INFORMED

Stay tuned to local Civil Defence information channels:

Be aware that the advice may change as information and scientific analysis comes to hand. If you have self-evacuated, you are safest to stay put until the next tide cycle.

- Make sure you have enough food and water (three litres per person, per day – and don't forget about pets) to last your family for three days.
- It's also a good idea to have a bag packed and ready with emergency supplies and warm, waterproof clothing that you can grab quickly if you need to evacuate.

Marine pests in Tasman waters

Marine organisms have been carried by vessels to our region for more than 150 years. Some, such as the Pacific oyster, have become so naturalised that most people think they have always been here. Some, however, have the potential to create havoc in our marine environment.

Unwanted marine organisms already present in coastal waters in parts of the top of the South include:

- *Undaria pinnatifida*, the edible Japanese seaweed, is now widespread in Tasman but is still absent from remote areas. While it has not proven to be as big a problem as initially expected, it is still not wanted in high value coastal areas such as the Abel Tasman shoreline.
- *Sabella spallanzanii*, the Mediterranean fan worm, has reproduced prolifically in Waitemata Harbour and is now present in low numbers in the Ports of Nelson and Waikawa. It has recently been detected in the Tasman region. Fouling by *Sabella* has caused significant problems

for marine farmers in the Thames Coromandel area and is of serious concern to top of the South marine farmers. Top of the South councils are working to develop a combined response.

- *Styela clava*, the clubbed tunicate, is also established in the Ports of Nelson Waikawa, Picton, and Tarakohe. While less concerning than *Sabella*, it is also a problem fouling organism for marine farms in the region.

It is vital that vessel owners remove biofouling and maintain effective anti-fouling on their vessels to stop these pests being moved into uninfested areas of the region. With the summer holiday period fast approaching it is time to ensure that all vessels cruising Tasman and Golden Bays have clean bottoms.

The most recent arrival detected in the top of the South is *Bonamia ostreae*, an oyster disease carried by shellfish. This protozoan has caused widespread mortality in European oyster populations and could pose a serious threat to oysters here.

“clock” for applications will stop on 20 December and start again on 10 January 2017. Please be aware that we have offered assistance to Kaikoura following the earthquake, and have two inspectors on standby to help out. If they are called on, inspection bookings will be limited for a time.

Tasman’s Street Ambassadors are back

The Tasman Street Ambassadors are back again this summer, helping keep our streets safe for everyone after dark.

Skilled youth workers will be out on the street in the Motueka and Richmond areas from early December to early February, between 8.30 pm – 2.30 am on Fridays and Saturdays. The Street Ambassadors team will patrol public places, delivering safety messages, offering

advice and assistance when needed and intervening with the aim of stopping trouble before it starts. They work in partnership with local police, community patrols and Maori wardens to keep our communities safe. They also engage with the public and provide information on Council bylaws and regulations, facilities and services, as well as events taking place across the district. The Street Ambassadors service is provided by Tasman District Council and delivered by Youth and Community Works.

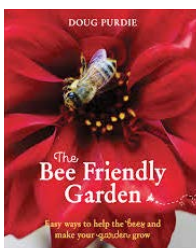

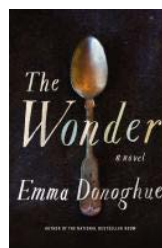

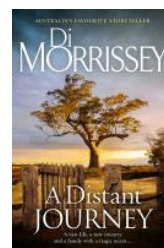
